

On Sunday's this summer, we are working our way through one section of Paul's letter to the Romans. We began at the end of chapter 4, and we'll be proceeding through the end of chapter 8.

In these chapters, Paul is teaching his readers about what life is like for those who are justified by their faith in God. Once we have entrusted ourselves to God's righteousness through faith in Christ, we live by the abounding grace of the Spirit.

We no longer belong to the powers of sin and darkness; we belong to Jesus, and that new identity begins to lead to a new life--new values, practices, and habits.

So much of the gospel message is summed up in its opening slogan, "Repent, for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand" (Matthew 3:2; 4:17). This section of Romans is particularly valuable to the church because it shows us what it looks like to work out that repentance in our whole lives.

Repentance means to turn. It is not *just* a one time turn from not believing in Jesus as Lord and Savior to believing in Jesus as Lord and Savior (though it certainly is not less than that either!), rather it is a daily turn of heart, mind, soul, and strength from entanglement in sinful desire and passion to pursuit of the holiness of Christ.

As Jesus himself advises his disciples, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take

up his cross and follow me" (Matt 16:24).

In Romans 5-8, Paul is giving us a detailed analysis of the why and how of this command of Christ.

The consistent refrain of the Collects of the Day throughout this part of the liturgical year is an evergreen call to the faithful to put on and practice the holiness that is ours in Christ Jesus.

This is the very pursuit Paul is exhorting his readers to sally forth on in Romans 5-8. As we bask in the long days of summer this July, let us also seek with whole hearts the things that are above--and are rightfully ours through Jesus Christ our Lord.
